
There are way too many memories with the Club. Even though we live anywhere from 4 to 5 hours away from events offered by MAR, in the early years, we didn't want to miss a thing.

The "Hero Package" included one car, Thursday welcoming party, Friday concours and rally, Friday lunch and dinner, two days track time, Saturday night banquet and a souvenir kit all for \$185. The event was a huge success.

We were attending one of Albert Turner's or Ron Spangler's events in Maryland in the 80's when we met Brian and Kathy Johnson. It was an instant friendship. Gordon was interested in old cars and so was Brian. Kathy had a fond relationship with cars. She drove their Ferrari and even purchased her own Lamborghini. She didn't hesitate to drive on the track. She encouraged me to drive our Ferrari which I did eventually. We became really good friends over the years and we still keep in touch with Brian. They introduced us to so many people in MAR: Austin, Barrett, Blackwood, Born, Cantera, Cantile, Carte, Current, Ebert, Hamilton, Johnson (W&R), Leyden, Marriott, Merritt, Meyer, Pegus, Ripley, Rippey, Rosa, Sauntry, Smith, Spangler, True, Tyler, Turner, White, just to name a few. I'm sure I have forgotten some but I know these people were consistent in supporting MAR during that time.

In the photo below are our friends Brian and Kathy Johnson. Wish I could remember where this picture was taken. I know it was a MAR event. They moved to Florida after they sold their 1961 SWB. She was a supporter of all of Brian's endeavors: racing his mustang, vintage racing, and restoring Porche tractors. Unfortunately, Kathy passed away several years ago. We miss her.

Gordon found a 1958 Ellena that was in Birmingham, AL. We borrowed a truck and trailer and Gordon, our son Taylor, and I, headed to Alabama. Taylor was five years old and I wondered how I was going to entertain him for all those hours. I taught him how to tie his shoes. That went well.

We got to Alabama and the car was basically in boxes and baskets. I never thought we would be going home without the car. We had driven too far. It took us years to restore it and finally in 1998 the Ellena made its debut at Road Atlanta. Not too many people are familiar with the Ellena but it is the sister to the Boano. The Boano has a low roof and the Ellena has a high roof. There were less than fifty made. We had that car for 41 years and we finally said goodbye and purchased a track car.

Most of the time we trailered our old Ferraris - many a time borrowing a trailer - because if the old car broke down, 1) old parts were not easy to come by, and 2) both of us had jobs to come back to on Monday. Fortunately for us, Brian wanted a new trailer so we bought his old trailer. A 1983 Wells Cargo



with no hydraulic lift. It was the second or third trailer Wells Cargo built. We still have it and use it for storage. We had to find another means to transport since the Wells Cargo rusted out. The best part, for me, was having the trailer at the track as it offered protection from the elements (sun, rain, hail and snow). Believe me over the years we experienced it all at Summit Point.

Betty Ebert was a remarkable artist. She designed many MAR Annual Meet covers, pins, patches and she painted lots of different Ferraris on canvas. At Christmas we always received a card that she had painted with a Ferrari on the front. So talented. Some time in the late 80's or early 90's we bought a 1973 Dino coupe. Bill and Betty had a Dino spyder. That was a bond we shared.

Bill Ebert and Betty had a huge roll in making the Region's activities very active. They were constantly coming up with new ideas for track and social events. Bill served as President of the Region for many years in the 90's.

When our son was in High School I told him if he made Honor Roll he could take the Dino to prom. Don't you know he did! Disappointedly, he had a fender bender in my Suburban the day of prom so Gordon said "Sorry son" and put the Dino in the garage.

Taylor ended up taking his date in a 4-Runner. But wait... the next year he was still dating the same girl and she was graduating from High School. He drove her to her Prom in the Dino, but, under the stipulation we were going to meet them at 11:00pm and exchange cars.



Gordon finally got his track car three years ago. It's a 2009 430 Scud. What an amazing car. Air conditioning, radio (we have yet to turn it on), power windows, and starts when you push the button every time.

These 50+ years with the Club definitely opened up our world. How fortunate we have been to meet wonderful people, experience different race tracks, and visit some amazing places.

Bill Ebert, in Memoriam

With great sadness the Mid-Atlantic Region, Ferrari Club of America, reports the peaceful passing Saturday, September 7th, of a dear friend and club member, Colonel William "Bill" Ebert, US Air Force, Retired. Bill, a New Jersey native, graduated from one of the early USAF Academy Classes. He was a pilot flying jets and spotter aircraft during the Vietnam War. Bill and his wife, Betty, traveled to postings all over the world.

As Bill grew up, along with his interest in aviation, he loved fast cars. And, when the opportunity presented itself, Bill and Betty added not only beautiful daughter, Laura, but a lovely red 246GTS Dino Spyder.

I met Bill and Betty when they came to Virginia in the mid 1980's. I think they were FCA members before coming to the D.C. area. Early on, they both volunteered to get involved with club events. That worked out perfectly when our Region was tasked with putting on the 1987 FCA Annual Meet. Bill and Betty became members of the 'Steve and Judy White kitchen table event organizers'. Bill took over coordinating hotel arrangements. Betty used her considerable



artistic talents to create the event logo, poster and signage and staffed registration tables. They were a big part of the overwhelmingly successful '87 Annual Meet.

Bill & Betty also contributed greatly to the successful 1991 FCA Annual Meet. Later on, they provided support for the 1997, 2006 and 2014 MAR-hosted FCA Annual Meets. Bill was our Regional Director twice, first in 1992 and again in the early 2000's. Bill served a term as FCA Vice President but made it clear he did not want to succeed to FCA President. Bill joined the cadre of International Advisory Council for Preservation of Ferrari Automobiles concours judges at FCA Annuals and the Cavallino Classic shows.

Bill and Betty's work for the Region included organizing overnight ride and drives in Virginia and West Virginia, 'The Virginia Grands'. They created the Mid-Atlantic Region's special annual award, 'The Good Times Award', given to the couple or individual that participated in and helped with the most events each year.

Bill and Betty participated in our Summit Point track events and car shows with their Dino and later with a 330GT 2+2. Ultimately, they added a bright yellow 550 Maranello. Bill and Betty's daughter, Laura, took an active place in our region hosting the annual "Spring Thaw" gatherings at various friendly Northern Virginia eateries.

I will finish by saying Bill was very easy to like. A good man with patience and a kind heart. I will miss his easy smile and gentle humor. Rest in peace Bill.

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Gran Turismo d'Appalachia

In early August the FCA's Mid-Atlantic Region ran its annual West Virginia Appalachian rally. Now named the Gran Turismo d'Appalachia, this event has been running for more than 15 years. I have run the last three events in a row as well as one about 15 years ago. In recent years this event has been expertly organized by the extremely detail-oriented Eric and Amy Tich. It is hugely popular, resulting in a sellout each year.

With a tropical storm, Debby, heading right for Washington on August 8, participants met at the start location, Ferrari of Washington (FoW). Due to the threat of Debby, some folks decided to forego the start and head right to our overnight location, Snowshoe Resort, and a few joined us but decided not to drive their Ferrari. FoW laid out a great choice of breakfast options with seating in the middle of many gorgeous cars in the showroom.

As the group left FoW in a caravan it was raining guite hard. It would have been a more picturesque route through northern Virginia if the weather was nicer. But, by the time we got to our first comfort/fuel stop the rain had stopped. We enthusiastically headed out after our break, enjoying the country roads, until

we got to section of low-lying road that was washed out by the overnight and morning rain! We scrambled to identify alternate routes, hoping we would not run into more road closures. Fortunately, we all made it to the lunch stop at Gennaro's (Italian) Restaurant in Moorefield, WV. They fed us well and sent us on our way.

Our next destination was the Snowshoe Resort. The route got more picturesque as we got into the mountains of West Virginia. Driving got challenging as we kept pace on these twisty mountain roads and gained experience driving our cars! The final hour of the drive consisted of continuous stretches of seemingly endless twisties including short straights where we could unleash our cars on very well-maintained roads.

The Snowshoe Resort had a parallel weekend event to our rally, the West Virginia Hillfest. Hillfest is a USAC-sanctioned hill

climb. Because of Hillfest, the village of Snowshoe was full of motorsports enthusiasts and cars of all types prepped for the hill climb. We stayed at the resort three nights, with dinners on site. One of the two main roads to the top of Snowshoe was closed for 3 days as it was used for the hill climb.

The FCA-MAR was invited to kick-start the hill climb Saturday morning with a 'parade lap' up the mountain. That morning we woke to very foggy conditions at the top of the resort but the fog mostly cleared as we went down the hill to the start line. We did our parade lap run up the hill climb course paced by one of the hill expert climb participants in his "drift" car

After the parade lap, we were on our own to explore the area or watch the hill climb runs. Eric proposed a few locations including an interesting distillery or Spruce Rock. We chose Spruce Knob, the highest point in WV. Most of the route was similar to our rally route with fast, twisty sections! The last 7 miles of the climb was on a narrow two-lane road which meant careful passing of oncoming tourists. We had lunch at the base of the Knob.

Sunday morning was our longest route and probably the best driving roads! We had a photo 'op' after a short drive to Big Spruce Overlook. We then headed to our lunch stop at Hawk's Nest State Park. Lunch was tasty and there was a great view from the main lodge. After lunch it was a short drive to Canyon Rim Visitor's Center. There were options depending on how adventurous you were for walking or driving. We took the easiest walk to the Canyon Rim Boardwalk.

We then headed back to Snowshoe on our own, taking quite a relaxing pace. When Eric and a couple of other cars appeared in our rear-view mirror, I picked up the pace to get us back to the resort a bit quicker. Dinner was a sit-down al fresco. Awards were given and a raffle earned over \$1,500 for the club's charity. Monday morning was quite special for the "techies" in the group. After passing a security clearance prior to the event, we had a private tour of the Green Bank Observatory, with the largest fully steerable radio telescope in the world. The tour included visiting two vintage control rooms of older "dishes", a walk around the outside of the BIG one and, after lunch, a visit to the control room for all the operational telescopes.

After the Green Bank Observatory, we all headed in different directions towards home. We came the furthest, from the Finger Lakes in Upstate NY, and for about a third of the way home enjoyed similar spectacular roads before getting to Interstates.

A.K. characterized the pace he'd set as "spirited, but certainly not a race pace". I had no idea what "spirited" meant to him, after all, we were in Ferraris! "We'll see", I thought. We were lined up, just waiting for the course to go hot.

When the light finally turned green, it was like A.K. shot his Mustang out of a cannon! Holy Moly! The lightning-fast start caught both Ted and me a little off guard; this was not going to be a "parade lap"! Smashing the accelerator to the floor, we caught up to A.K. winding through the mountain road. 
Gran Turismo d'Appalachia - Our Ferrari Family

Gran Turismo d'Appalachia - exhilarating!

When the invitation to attend the 2024 Gran Turismo d'Appalachia arrived, I knew it was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Describing my first Ferrari Club experience: an exhilarating and iconic sensation!

I packed my carry-on suitcase with sweaters and casual clothes to prepare for Snowshoe Mountain Ski Resort in West Virginia. Thunderstorms were heading toward the District of Columbia and West Virginia from tropical storm Debby. Beginning with a sense of danger, this exciting adventure would confirm I made the right decision to attend.



At 7:07 am, I received a text that my ride had arrived. I walked down to the first floor of the parking garage. Stepping out of the elevator, I immediately laid eyes on the bright red Ferrari, its engine revving and my adrenaline kicking in.

We arrived at the kickoff breakfast at Ferrari of Washington. I was eager to observe the people and personalities of those attracted to the Ferrari Club. With a well-thought-out breakfast buffet and a coffee stand, we sat at the orange-clothed table surrounded by the colors of the rainbow. Amy and Phil Waterbury sat next to us. Eric Tich, Events Coordinator for FCA Mid-Atlantic, described the next three-day itinerary: Snowshoe Hillside Climb, Scenic Drives, and the Green Bank Observatory.

Great driving, amazing food, and the most unique and impressive car garage – this was the event not to miss. Should FCA-MAR hold this event again, I will be the first to sign up.




